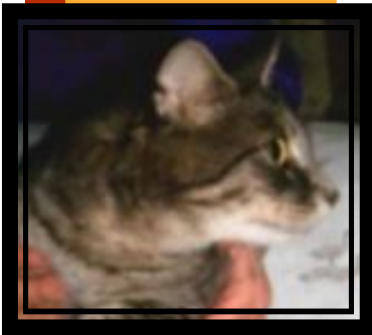

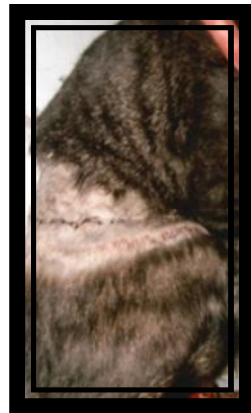

Gus, a resident in Saugus was referred to Mass-PAWS when he spotted a cat in his yard encircled by a snare trap!!! Our volunteer extraordinaire, Carol, responded right away and Nugget was brought to Revere Pet Clinic. Thinking that he had tangled with a wire or part of a fence, we had NO



IDEA how complicated or life-threatening his injuries were.

What we learned from the Vet when we were told he could go "home" was that Nugget had been caught in a snare trap intended for small animals; one that clamps down on their skin and tears into the animal when they try to get away;

a horrible, atrocious device. How his little guy walked around with it surrounding him and how he survived was truly amazing and a testament to the spirit of cats.

Dr. Olga took him right into surgery, carefully removed the trap, and with the precision of a plastic surgeon put in OVER 200 SUTURES to close his wounds. In addition, Gus was neutered, tested for FeLeuk and FIV; vaccinated, wormed and de-fleaed.

The costs for Nugget was

several hundred dollars, but the cost to this small creature in terms of pain could not be measured, as those traps are very painful and ILLEGAL.

We are grateful to Barbara Jones of PALS for providing R&R for Nugget, and giving him the love, medicine and food that he needed to recuperate. He rewards her every day with purrs and pats. I do believe that he comprehends that we helped him.

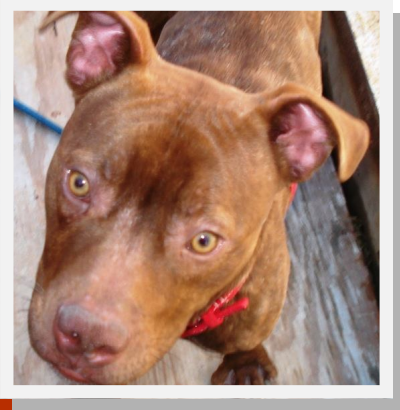

Pets and Domestic Violence

S. 682: An Act Relative to Domestic Violence and Animals: The research documenting the link between animal abuse and violence toward humans is increasing. Following similar laws in seventeen other states, this bill would specifically permit the inclusion of pets in abuse prevention orders. Concern for what will happen to a pet at times prevents victims from leaving a violent situation. By ensuring that a pet is safe, this bill helps remove that barrier. This bill enables courts to order the protection of an animal through existing specific statutes that authorize restraining orders or orders to vacate or stay away.

This bill enables courts to order the protection of an animal through existing specific statutes that authorize restraining orders or orders to vacate or stay away.

What This Bill Would Do:

The bill would provide protection for both human and animal victims of domestic violence. The link

between animal cruelty and human violence is well documented in both study statistics and stories of abuse. Like children, pets are often used as pawns in domestic violence. Batterers abuse animals for a variety of reasons - to demonstrate power and control, to retaliate for acts of independence, to keep a victim silent and to coerce a victim to return or stay in an abusive relationship.

Fear for the welfare of a household pet often prevents battered women from escaping abusive relationships. One study found that up to 48% of battered women will not leave, or will return to a violent relationship due to fear of what might happen to the animal if left behind.

Emergency Preparedness for Pets

Whether contending with a storm, wildfire burning out of control, local flooding, or accidents that require the evacuation of entire neighborhoods at any time, the best way to protect your family from the effects of any emergency situation is to have a disaster plan in place. If you are a pet owner, that plan must include your pets. A little preparation can save their lives. Start by assembling a pet disaster supply kit in an easy-to-carry, waterproof container. It should be stored in an accessible location away from areas with temperature extremes. Replace the food, water and medications as often as needed to maintain their freshness and avoid expiration dates. Indicate if additional medications are stored in the refrigerator.

- ◆ Information on feeding schedules, medical conditions, behavioral problems and the contact information of your veterinarian in case you have to foster or board your pets
 - ◆ Pet beds and toys (to reduce stress), if easily transportable
- Contact hotels outside your

immediate area regarding policies on accepting pets and restrictions on the number, size and species. Ask if "no pet" policies could be waived in the event of an emergency. Keep a list of pet friendly places, including phone numbers, with other disaster information and supplies. If you have notice of an impending disaster, call ahead for reservations.

Prepare a list of boarding facilities and veterinarians who could shelter your pets in case of an emergency. Ask local animal shelters if they provide emergency shelter or foster care for pets in a disaster.

Animal shelters may be overburdened caring for the animals they already have as well as those displaced by a disaster, so this should be your last resort. If you are given orders to evacuate your home, **DO NOT LEAVE YOUR PETS BEHIND!** You may not be able to find them when you're able to return.

Preparation before disaster strikes will enable you to evacuate with your pets quickly and safely, but keep in mind, animals react differently under stress. Always remember:

- ◆ Keep dogs securely leashed outside your home and in the car.
- ◆ Always transport cats in carriers.
- ◆ Don't leave pets unattended anywhere they might run off.
- ◆ Even the most trustworthy pets may panic, hide, try to escape, bite or scratch.
- ◆ And, when you return home, give your pets time to settle back into their routines. Consult your veterinarian if behavioral problems persist. Planning ahead for a disaster can save lives and makes a very stressful situation less severe. Contact your veterinarian for more advice on creating a pet disaster supply kit specific to your individual animals, and for emergency first aid procedures and instruction on the administration of meds.
